This duty has come to me because I am the president of the Classical Association of Florida, the teachers' organization that bears the same relationship to the Florida Junior Classical League as your sponsor has to your own Junior Classical League chapter. It is in this capacity that I write to you today.

In this short time, over $\$ 2,000$ have been donated in the form of various items and, of course, cold, hard cash. Every Christmas, Latin Club also buys gifts for a needy family. Latin Club, in addition to giving prodigious amounts of money, also motivates the other clubs and students to give to charities.
